## LANGUAGE - CLOZE live with parents"

A new study from the Pew Research Center has (1) $\qquad$ that most adults under 30 years old are now living with their parents. The study says the number of 18- to 30-year-olds who live at home has (2) $\qquad$ an 80 -year high. Around 52 per cent, or 26.6 million, of young people are at home with one or both of their parents. Whenever scientists create a vaccine for COVID-19, governments worldwide will be (1) Scrambling for cargo aircraft. Distributing the vaccine will be one of the biggest (2) logistical operations ever. Aviation experts have forecast that transporting the vaccine across the globe will require around $8,000747{ }^{(3)}$ freight planes.
