Reading, listening, miming and speaking activity, group work

Focus

Being polite

Could you..., please?

Thank you

You're welcome

Aim

To make polite requests with 'Could you..., please?' and respond with 'thank you' and 'you're welcome'.

Preparation

Make one copy of the cards for each group of three or four and cut as indicated.

Level

Elementary (A1-A2)

Time

25 minutes

Introduction

In this being polite game, students make polite requests with 'Could you..., please?' and respond with 'thank you' and 'you're welcome'.

Procedure

Divide the students into groups of three or four and give each group a set of cards.

Ask the students to shuffle the cards and place them face-down in a pile on the desk.

The students take it in turns to pick up the top card from the pile and change the command on the card into a polite request starting with 'Could you' and ending with 'please'.

The other group members then race to do or mime the requested action.

The student who made the request responds by saying 'Thank you' to the first student to do the action correctly.

That student wins the round, keeps the card, and replies with 'You're welcome'.

Example:

Card: Tell me your name.

Student A: Could you tell me your name, please?

Student B: My name is Lucy. Student A: *Thank you*, Lucy. Student B: You're welcome.

Students can settle any ties with rock, paper, scissors.

Play continues until all the cards have been correctly acted out.

The student with the most cards at the end of the game wins.
