

 1837 to 1901. This period of time is called "the Victorian Era."
- 2. Victoria became queen when she was 18 years old. She married her first cousin Albert, and together they had nine children. After Albert died in 1861, Victoria became **depressed**. She wore black for the rest of her life.
- 3. The Victoria Day weekend marks the beginning of summer in Canada. Many **retired** people who move farther south during the cold months return home. A lot of families open their **cottages** for the summer season. Others enjoy spending time at campgrounds.
- 4. Some Canadians think it is time to break away from the British **monarchy**, but others like the connection. No matter how they feel about the monarchy, most Canadians enjoy the long weekend and its **parades**, outdoor festivals, and **fireworks**.

Idioms

- **drama queen:** a person who has big reactions to normal situations
- royal treatment: extra attention and care
- Prince Charming: the ideal male partner who is handsome and kind

- a royal pain: an annoying person or thing
- until kingdom come: forever, a long time
